Aeroplane Labels of Jamaica: USES

Aeroplane Labels of Jamaica



Type 3 labels were officially released January 15, 1916. This cover shows pre-First Day use on January 13th.



Registered cover, June 19, 1916, New York Registry backstamp June 28. Very scarce use of all four issues of the label (on the same cover).

In 1915 the "Jamaica War Stamp League" was organized by Lewis Ashenheim of Jamaica. This name was changed on April 1, 1916, to the "Jamaica Patriotic Stamp League." The purpose of this organization was to aid the British Red Cross, to create a Jamaica Aeroplane Fund and to offer relief to Polish Jews in Eastern Europe, who had already suffered greatly due to the events of WWI.

To raise funds a special label was prepared, showing a bi-plane and the Red Cross symbol, and sold for a halfpenny each. The label was approved for use on outgoing mail from the island, in addition to regular postage. It was not required to be used. Four different types were issued, the first on December 1, 1915.

Type 1-Basic stamp, printed by Dennison Manufacturing Co. in Framingham, Mass.

Type 2-Overprinted JAMAICA in red. All overprinting done locally by the Gleaner Co., Kingston. (Dec 22, 1915)

Type 3-Overprinted JAMAICA in black. (Jan 15, 1916)


Type 4-Overprinted JAMAICA and also "Half penny," in black. (Mar 11, 1916)






THE 1912 GREEK OCCUPATION OF MYTILENE Overprint on 1908-1909 Turkish definitive stamps







Chitral Relief Force Wrapper

 Fort Chitral, near the Afghanistan/Pakistan border was besieged in 1895 by thousands of local tribesman. A relief column was sent from Gilgit (present day northwestern Pakistan tribal areas) 150 miles away over rugged terrain and helped break the siege. This 1/2 Anna wrapper demonstrates the capability of the Indian Post Office to get a civilian his newspaper and the memorializes the heroic effort made to save the 500 souls trapped at Chitral.



Halbmondlager, Zossen Germany a World War I Jihad Camp for Moslem POWs

This cover was sent to Arjun Singh, Sepoy No. 2250, a POW held at the Halbmondlager or crescent moon camp near Zossen, Germany during World War I. The camp was established by Germany to encourage moslem POWs to rebel against Britain and France by joining the Ottoman forces in Jihad. Some 20,000 POWs went through this camp, but only about 1000 joined the Jihad. This cover was censored at Bombay and marked with a BYL 9 #27 censor hand stamp. The cover was delivered first to the Indian Base Office in Boulogne, France where it was again cancelled. This mark is mostly obscured by the military censor tape, "OPENED BY CENSOR. 22". From there it would have been forwarded to the International Red Cross Committee for delivery to Germany. There are German censor marks on the cover.

Pony Express Cover?

Pony Express two dollar green, tied on a 10 c. green entire bearing red Wells Fargo & Co. frank. The indicie is tied by normal blue Wells Fargo & Co. double ring circle 13APR cancel, and the cover is addressed to New York City.

This cover was a part of the famous Alfred F. Lichtenstien Collection for probably 70 to 80 years, and was valued as part of the estate in the 1970s at \$60,000. At the time of the breakup of the collection for auction, there was some question by the writer about the cancel on the stamp, which after a few days of study turned out to be NEW ORLEANS...which is not on the Pony's route. Oops!





United States 1869 Cover?

U.S. 1869 90c. cover. It doesn't take a nuclear scientist to figure out that a forger should not fabricate an item when there is only one known. i.e. Mona Lisa, etc. I admire the gall it took to do this cover, and it is absolute loveliness. The envelope itself, the colorful markings, and it's all real, except...the genuine 90c. doesn't belong. I would almost rather have this than the real one. The topper is, it has a 1974 certificate from the famous house of A. Diena, saying that it is...genuine. Oops!

A Sampling of What I Collect

Inauguration Covers that Judges Do Not Count



A collection of Presidential Inauguration Day Covers is not considered by exhibition judges as meaningful unless the covers are postmarked in Washington, DC or the location of the inauguration on the day of the inauguration. However, it is very difficult to find covers for 19th Century Inaugurations as there wasn't widespread collecting of these covers so I include postmarked covers from any city on the inauguration day. Above are three such covers. A stampless cover postmarked Mar. 4, 1801 the day of Thomas Jefferson's first inauguration. The Mar. 4 date is clear and the letter inside is dated Feb. 10, 1801 confirming the year. The location of the letter writer was Tobago which is in the Caribbean. The second cover was postmarked in Massachusetts on Mar. 4, 1881 the date of James Abram Garfield's Inauguration as President and Chester Alan Arthur as Vice President. President Garfield died on September 19, 1881 in Elberon, NJ at 10:35 pm of a gunshot wound received on Jul. 2, 1881 and Vice President Chester A Arthur became President. Arthur was sworn in on Sep. 20, 1881 at 2:15 am in his New York City home by NY Supreme Court Justice John R. Brady. On Sep. 22 a second oath was administered by US Supreme Court Chief Justice Morrison R. Waite in Washington, DC. The bottom cover is postmarked on Sep 22, 1881 in Arizona Territory.

Imperforates of Ceylon

ALL THE ORIGINAL IMPERFORATES OF CEYLON

I chose this topic as I have managed to get the FULL SET, including the 4d Pink, for which I have the Royal Philatelic Society's authentication Certificate.

I have lived in Sri Lanka, off and on, for nearly Nine (9) years and have come to love that beautiful country and it's people, more than the country of my birth, i.e. India.

I collected these while I was posted in Sri Lanka, and having nothing much to do, went around all the three (3) stamp dealers and friendly collectors and managed to get the full set, a rare thing this late, after the issue in years 1857 to 1859.

- This constitutes the First issued stamp of 6 d. specifically printed for a letter to England.
- Later the full set of Eleven (11) stamps issued, which turned out to be Seventeen (17) as included in the Gibbons color variations of some of the values.
- Later still, the two (2) paper varieties of Half-Penny stamps were issued, so far all Imperforates.

(ALL subsequent stamps were Perforated).

CEYLON UNPERFORATES

CEYLON formerly under British Administration, attained independence in 1948, and became a Dominion, but later gained it's Independence as **Republic of SRI LANKA** on 4 February 1972. Ceylon has a history recorded, going back to 3,000 years, is home to several religions and cultures.

The first Postal adhesive stamp was issued in 1857 by Perkins Bacon, of six-pence value, in purple-brown color, with Star Watermark, imperforate. The stamp indicated Queen Victoria's portrait by William Humphrys, who had designed similar stamps for other countries as well. This stamp was issued to pay for sending standard letter to Great Britain


Later, similar stamps were printed by De La Rue, in values ranging from one (1) penny to 2 Shillings, and still later in half-penny value, all imperforates. (Perforated stamps were issued in 1861)



Postmarks of Place-Names Referenced in Beatles Lyrics

 I came across the Machin stamp with a "Blackburn/Lancs" postmark some months ago and immediately the famous line from "A Day in the Life" popped into my head. I put the stamp aside, not sure where it would end up. A few weeks later, I came across the Queen Victoria 4-penny stamp with the Kirkcaldy CDS, and recalled the obscure lyric from "Cry Baby Cry" on the White Album. On a roll, I added the Lime St/Liverpool CDS (Maggie May) and found the Isle of Wight one (When I'm Sixty-Four) in a postmark accumulation I had bought. A fifth stamp, "Docks B.O./Southampton" (The Ballad of John and Yoko) is on the way. My next challenge: to find a BOAC first-flight cachet from Miami Beach (Back in the USSR). I'm not sure whether one exists.



Barth Healey's Journalism Topical Collection

- My late father was an avid stamp collector and, for several years, was The New York Times stamp columnist. He spent nearly his whole professional life as a newspaper reporter or editor. I remember very clearly when he picked up stamp collecting again in his 30s, after a hiatus to raise two sons, that one of his first endeavors was to put together a topical collection about journalists and journalism. I still have the album, which, naturally, I treasure. This page shows three different sets from Poland, each honoring the press or printing trade in some way.
- My father eventually gave up the topic after realizing that Marx and Engels were journalists, too, in their younger days - he decided he didn't want to devote his collection to accumulating multitudes of Communist propaganda stamps from Eastern Europe!

- They often went through the mails undetected











Booklet 1 & 2

Booklet #1

One of three complete booklets known to have survived. First issued on 1 September, 1913 with several reprints to 1916. With approximately 1.3 million booklets printed, it is surprising that only 3 complete intact booklets have been reported to date. These were printed by De La Rue with 4 x 1d panes of 6 and 2 x ½d panes of 6 totalling 2sh 6d. The panes of stamps were separated by blank interleaves. These booklets were stapled either left or right as no special plates were made for their printing. The back cover quotes Inland and Rhodesian telegraph rates.

One of less than five known. Issued in early 1917. Identical to booklet no. 1 apart from the back cover being changed with Savings Bank rates replacing the telegraph rates for Rhodesia. Approximately 1.3 million booklets printed.

Only one plate was used to produce sheets of these stamps which were in two panes of 120 stamps each. One pane was inscribed in English and the other in Afrikaans. It was not necessary to alternate the languages as the stamps were to be distributed as singles in unilingual packets of 60 stamps Each packet was inscribed 60 4d Postage or 60 4d Poseel. Uncut panes were also available in Post Offices from April 1926.


